Are You a ReadySteward?

Are you like most of us who don't have a family disaster plan? What does that have to do with Stewardship anyway?

Stewardship is more than giving. It is about taking care of God's gifts. If a disaster occurs, those who are prepared are called to be stewards by taking care of neighbors and others in need.

What's the hurry? Just because Japan endured a terrible earthquake and then a tsunami doesn't mean those things will occur in the USA. Actually, all 50 states and all U.S. territories are vulnerable to earthquakes. Rapidly melting snow in many states causes rampant flooding that can displace families and livelihoods. Spring and tornado season have always been synonymous.

Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) encourages participation by all churches in national preparedness efforts. It is called the "ReadyChurch" initiative, and it is a great form of stewardship. We are encouraged to be informed, make a plan and make a kit.

Be informed. Think about the types of natural disasters that could occur in our community/state even though it doesn't appear that Colorado is prone to earthquakes and major flooding. That doesn't mean either won't ever occur. How about tornados, are we prepared the type of tornadoes that have caused severe damage and death in the state?

Make a plan. Now is the time to think about what we would do if one of the disasters actually happened. Where would we go? How would we communicate? Where would the Saint Peter congregation meet if our church was unusable? Write a plan and review it regularly.

Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

- Water: one gallon of water per person, per day for three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food: at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with charger

It's best to put all your kit items in a water-tight container for storage and easy transport. Remember to check your list once a year to replace outdated food, water or prescriptions, and check batteries in flashlights and radios.

There are a number of additional items you might want to include in your ReadyKit. Most of these would depend on family preference, ages and other factors.

Once you have prepared your Kit, think about putting together a second one for a household that might not be able to afford to purchase the supplies. Be a ReadySteward!

From the Pastor

A Season for Growth

Saint Peter is a church that is committed to a liturgical tradition that shapes our life together; a tradition that invites us to learn from the wisdom of our ancestors in faith. One of the ways that happens for us is through the rhythm of the liturgical calendar.

Each year our worship life is measured by seasons. During the first half of the year, our seasons follow the birth, life, ministry, passion, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. We stand off to the side and observe as he is born, as he preaches and teaches and heals, as he suffers and dies, and perhaps most importantly: as God raises him from death. Through this annual attention to his story we are reminded of the deep and persistent love of God. We are reassured in the promises of our baptism. We are grounded in the hope of eternal life.

So goes the first half of the liturgical year. Advent through Easter. This year, that part of the journey reaches its destination on "The Day of Pentecost" (June 12th this year), as the Holy Spirit fills the disciples, and sends them into the streets of Jerusalem to share the good news of the resurrection.

Then comes a season that lasts nearly half the year. For twenty-three Sundays (this year), we find ourselves in a season that nobody seems to know what to call. In some traditions, like ours, it is the season of "Sundays after Pentecost." Others refer to it as "Common Time", or "Ordinary Time." But while it lacks for a name, it thrives with a purpose: it is a season of growth. It is a season that asks questions like these:

- What does the life and death and resurrection of Jesus mean for us?
- How does Jesus continue to live on among us?
- How does Jesus empower us to be his presence in this world?
- How does God help us to grow in faith and in faithfulness?

I enjoy the first half of the liturgical year, and the opportunity to reflect on the life of Christ. But once we draw near to the mid-year transition, I look forward to this new season, and the way its texts challenge us to grow in Christ.

This year, on the first "Sunday after Pentecost", we'll turn to these familiar words – the last ones Jesus spoke to his followers:

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age. [St. Matthew 28:19-20]

So we enter into this season of growth. And there is purpose in this growth: through these weeks, God strengthens us to go, as Jesus has commanded us, and share the faith we have received with the entire world.

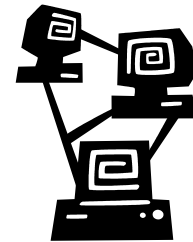
"One Little Word"

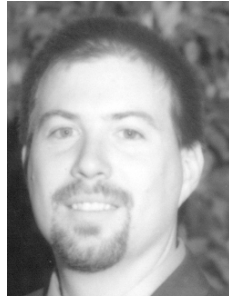

What Will You See Today?

What will you see today? No, not just the obvious, but the not-so-obvious as well; those things that “just are” or that take place during a busy day that may go unnoticed. On a clear day, at the intersection of Smoky Hill Road and Piccadilly you can experience the grandeur of Pikes Peak and span north across the entire front range. It is a truly spectacular sight! As you drive west on C-470 at about Broadway you can begin to make out the pine trees growing on the foothills – not en mass, but individual trees!

What will you see today? There is a spot driving north on I-29 in South Dakota where the highway peaks on a rolling hill, and you can see for miles and miles field after field of corn, while a huge flock of birds dances in the sky. The blooming cherry blossoms surrounding the Tidal Basin offer delicate beauty and sweet aroma for our founding father, Thomas Jefferson. Less than 100 yards away in a small area of his own sits a larger-than-life George Mason, one leg crossed over the other, ankle to knee, an open book resting on the bench next to him, as it appears he is just waiting for someone to sit next to him and strike up a conversation.

What will you see today? Will you notice the lovely single lady, gray hair, soft smile, quiet hands folded in her lap, who appears to be at peace? Will you look deeper and see her loneliness and heartbreak? Will she let you? Will you keep looking and seeking in order to offer comfort and care, or is it easier to glance once, take what you see at face value and look elsewhere? Will you see the little bowed head and hear the soft sweet voice of the child just learning the Lord’s Prayer? Will you see the anticipation in the eyes of the tiny child at the altar, watching as the Body of Christ is placed in his Daddy’s hands, waiting for his own special blessing, those quiet words and a soft forehead touch from the pastor?

What will you see today? Will you see the faces of the lost, the lonely, the hungry, the frightened, and the weary? And if you see these faces, will you look away? How can you not? How can you not look deeper and find a way to offer comfort and care? Will you see the sparkle in the eyes of those elderly who have become child-like again? Will you see beyond the bent fingers, messy hair and food stained shirt to the beauty and wisdom within? How can you not?

What will you see today? When you look in the mirror today, what will you see? Will you see beyond the reflection of your face to your heart? The reflection in the mirror is the obvious – hair, eyes, teeth, skin – all familiar, and while not always perhaps to our liking, the obvious reflection none the less. But our hearts – will we see inside of ourselves to what really and truly matters?

What will you see today? When you look deep inside yourself, will you see into your own heart? Will you see Christ there in your heart? Will you feel his presence – that soft comforting presence that at the very same time is strong? Will you see and feel Christ’s love in your heart? How can you not? How can you not share that love with the world? How can you not share that love with the not-so-obvious beauty in this world?

What will you see today? Will you look around, look beyond your own shadow and see the beauty and wonder of this world?
