











Age-adjusted gun death rate per 100,000





Among the counties in Colorado, Park County had the highest gun death rate, followed by Huerfano County and Las Animas County.




Conversely, Boulder County had the lowest gun death rate, followed by Eagle County and Douglas County.

U.S. suicides are by firearm













Nonfatal suicide attempts

- ✓ Higher among males
- ✓ Higher in rural areas
- \checkmark Highest among white people
- Higher in states with more firearms

Firearm Homicide – Mass Shooting Events

Relatively rare events, accounting
for less than 1% of all firearm
deaths (U.S. + CO)

BUT

- ✓ Often dominate media
- ✓ Devastate entire communities
- ✓ Wide reaching impact
- ✓ Psychological effects

Coloradans are most concerned their communities and their families will be impacted by mass and school shooting events.






Firearm Homicide – Domestic Violence

50+% Intimate partner homicides in U.S. involve a firearm

Domestic violence assaults are 12x more likely to end in death if a firearm is involved

The use of firearms in DV situations increases the risk of multiple fatalities


Firearm Homicide – Community Violence

- Takes place in under-resourced city neighborhoods
- Disproportionately impacts Black and Hispanic/Latino communities specifically young Black and Hispanic/Latino men
- Usually occurs outside of the home in a public setting
- Occurs between individuals who are not intimately related (not domestic violence)
- Often is sparked by a dispute between individuals or groups and may be retaliatory as a result of long-standing conflicts
- Sometimes referred to as "urban violence" or "group violence"




Young Black males ages 15-34 make up 2% of the U.S. population but account for 37% of all firearm homicide deaths



Disproportionately impacted population



Non-Fatal Injuries

Every year there are over 71,000 nonfatal gunshot injuries in the United States



51% of non-fatal firearm injuries are a result of firearm assault and an additional 37% are unintentional injuries

Disproportionately impact young adult males

Individuals who live in the poorest neighborhoods are 6.9x more likely to suffer a nonfatal firearm injury compared to those who live in the wealthiest

Non-physical impacts on those involved

80% Americans experience stress following a mass shooting


1/3 American adults say their fear of mass shootings prevents them from going to certain events









Most Colorado adults who personally own firearms are between the ages of 35-54.









Public Health Approach





Prevention

Counseling and education: Safe storage campaigns; Firearm training courses

Clinical intervention: Lethal means safety counseling; violence intervention programs

Long-lasting protective intervention: Extreme risk laws

Changing the context to make individual's default decisions healthy: Pass universal background checks, firearm licensing, Repeal stand your ground laws

Socioeconomic factors: Address inequity and structural racism; Fund social services, education, housing, job training

	PREVENTING CAR CRASHES	PREVENTING FIREARM DEATHS
RESEARCH	Allocate funds to study the epidemic of motor vehicle crashes.	Allocate funds to the CDC and the NIH to research gun violence.
REGULATE	Federal agencies regulate car manufacturers and ensure car safety.	Allow federal agencies to regulate firearm manufacturers and ensure gun safety.
LICENSING	Drivers must submit an application and pass a test to obtain a driver's license.	Require firearm purchasers to submit an application, undergo a background check, and take safety education to obtain a license to own a firearm.
REGISTRATION	Car registration is required at each point of sale.	Pass firearm registration laws to ensure that firearms are registered at each point of sale.
PROHIBIT RISKY PEOPLE	Reckless and drunk driving laws ensure that risky individuals do not endanger others on the road.	Expand firearm prohibitions to include individuals who are at elevated risk for violence.
AGE REQUIREMENTS	Age requirements for obtaining a driver's license, including a graduated licensing system (driver's permit) for young drivers.	Enact stronger age requirements for owning or possessing all types of firearms.
